BOUNDARY COMMISSION PROPOSED CHANGES

The Boundary Commission for England (BCE) has published its initial proposals for new constituency boundaries. The 2023 Review of Parliamentary constituencies was formally launched in January 2021. The Commission is required to ensure that the number of electors in each constituency is more equal; in doing so, the number of constituencies in England will increase from 533 to 543. The Commission is undertaking an independent review of all constituency boundaries in England and will present our final recommendations to Parliament by July 2023.

It is proposed that our parish becomes part of a new Parliamentary constituency, The Cotswolds, and is removed from the Stroud constituency to become allied with towns in the north Cotswolds such as Stow-on-the-Wold and Moreton-in-Marsh. This is something that our local parish councils have voiced opposition to.

Members of the public are encouraged to visit www.bcereviews.org.uk to view maps showing the proposed new boundaries and make comment. The secondary consultation period is open until **Monday 4th April**.

OAKRIDGE HISTORY GROUP



Our first meeting of 2022 was a well-attended Do-It-Ourself session on Oakridge houses and families with John and Kay sharing lots of photos and research on the changes that have taken place particularly along the Broadway and along the top road leading to Bisley (Holloway Road).

The Lloyd George Survey of 1910 and the many photographs collected on the website from the first part of the 20th century provided lots of information on the physical state of the buildings to compare and contrast with the village as we see it now. For example, in 1910 on the Broadway there were 7 properties + 1 ruin + the Mill and Mill house, now there are 15 properties + the Mill house. On the road to Bisley there were 3 properties + 1 uninhabitable on the right going out of the village, now there are 8 on the right plus 10 more on the left. Quite a change both in amenities and also in the number of people in each household! Members of the audience participated adding their recollections and comments on all the changes.

At the March meeting Kirsty Hartsiotis gave a fascinating talk on the various arts and crafts World War One memorials in Gloucestershire including our own Oakridge War Memorial.

NATURE NOTES FROM WATERLANE



This is the time of the year when song birds start their dawn chorus confirming it's nature's way that spring is truly here. In the daily cycle, as in the seasonal cycle, light is the key factor affecting bird song, night changing to day has the same song producing effect on birds as winter changing to summer.

Singing of course, is in part about male birds trying to attract a mate and showing off. It's a talent show, each trying to convince any female within earshot that his vocal prowess proves he'd be a fit father for her young. However song is also aimed from one male to another, a loud-hailer message that proclaims "this is my patch". Some of our resident birds have been limbering up for a couple of months or so, taking the advantage of still, sunny winter days to practice. Then from mid-March, new voices begin to arrive, starting with the chiffchaff, that like the cuckoo sings its own name, and is soon joined by blackcaps and willow warblers. By mid-April, the flood gates are open as millions of migrant birds pour back in from Africa to their summer homes. By early May the chorus is at its peak.

The skylark and blackbird are the first to break into song, starting about 40 minutes before sunrise, closely followed by the song thrush, wood pigeon, robin, mistle thrush, pheasant, willow warbler and wren, usually in that order. My personal song favourites, other than the robin and blackbird, are the wren with a penetrating rapid trilling song, and the bullfinch which sounds like it is falling off a cliff.

OAKRIDGE PAROCHIAL SCHOOL



It has been a super busy term at Oakridge and we still have two weeks to go!

Recently, the children were invited to take part in a tree planting event in Chalford, a project which was conceived by one of our parents Gill Skeffington two years ago to raise awareness of our village school and do some wildlife habitat creation at the same time.

Gill has persevered through the pandemic to keep the project going, and with parents' help, has worked hard to facilitate the practicalities. We are also grateful to Annie Kleiner of Coppice Hill who responded to our appeal for suitable land to undertake the project, a pocket of scrub linking two areas of woodland close to the Dimmel's Dale Wildlife Reserve. It was a truly rewarding experience for our children to be involved. Over 100 British native broadleaved trees have been planted this year, by four school groups - Oakridge planted 32 trees. The children are welcome to visit the site and the trees with their families or the school, watch them grow and enjoy the wild space. We are grateful to all who have been involved in this exciting project.

Last week (w/c 14th March) we celebrated STEM with a particular focus on science and DT (design technology). Class 1 children learnt about light and Class 2 forces - linked to our topic. In Class 2 our book 'The man who walked between the towers' is an inspiring book about the true experience of Philippe Petit who walked between the two towers of the World Trade Centre in New York in 1974. It provided ample opportunities to explore. In science the children carried out an investigation to find out whose parachute could land the safest and slowest for Philippe the main character in the book. They were also challenged to build the tallest tower using a certain amount of marshmallows and 12 sticks of spaghetti!

In DT both classes focused on mechanisms and mechanical systems; class 1 using levers to create owls for a shadow puppet show and really complex linkages to create a moving picture for the children's author Charlotte Guillan's book "The skies above my eyes." The results were incredible! On the other hand, Class 2 designed and made cranes for Philippe to lift him to the top of One World Trade Centre tower. Pulleys were used as the mechanism and some children even used motors!


Finally, our week ended with a visit to We the Curious science museum in Bristol. We had a wonderful day. The weather was gorgeous and, as well as experiencing all that is on offer at the museum (engaging hands-on activities, a light show and a planetarium show), it was the first proper trip we have experienced in the last couple of years. I wonder where we will go next?!

Spotlight on Louisa Crisp

We came to live at Hillhouse Farm in 1964 when I was 8 years old. My parents, Captain and Mrs L.E. D Walthall, came to see the farm all the way from Scotland where we were living at the time. Mum fell in love with it straight away but Dad wasn't so sure. Anyway, on

the day of the auction he set off in good time, planning to see the property once more before he bought it. However he ran short of time and only just made it to the auction. The farm was being sold in six lots and dad could only afford two of them. The other four lots were sold to individual buyers and thus the estate known as Hillhouse was broken up.

After the auction Dad came to look over his purchase and was shocked at the decaying state of what he had bought. He always said if he had seen it as he had planned before the auction he would not have bid for it. Fate had obviously stepped in. A few weeks later a man approached Dad and asked if he would sell the farm to him. He had been prevented from going to the auction by a car accident. Mum was overjoyed at what she considered to be divine intervention.....

The house and farmland was very run down, having been lived in solely by an old lady called Miss Bruce for a good many years. Miss Bruce was a pioneer of her time and had developed 'quick return compost' which in her lifetime spread all over the world. In those days Hillhouse Farm was often referred to as "Compost castle". She was also a founder of the soil association, together with Lady Balfour. Miss Bruce had let much of the farm fall apart, scarily so as I remember a ceiling fell down on my bed during our first week in residence. Luckily I was at school!

We had no spare money for extras and lived for many years with bare floor boards, pink plaster walls, a leaking roof, a dodgy windmill which tried to supply our water and a host of other difficulties. But we were so happy, we all loved it and my Grandpa bought me a pony on which I explored the surrounding countryside. We all helped dad in the holidays whether we were bringing in heavy stones from the fields, driving the tractor in and out with barley grains stacked high in the trailer or making hay. In those days we made hay by hand with pitch forks and muscle. (Gosh I sound so old!)

Miss Bruce had three gardeners in her heyday. Her head gardener, Mr Lesley Pearman, threatened to leave her at one stage so she bribed him to stay by offering to build him a house on the land now known as Spring Bank. The Pearmans lived in their tiny house for many happy years and their daughter Pauline still lives locally today. Mrs Queenie Pearman worked as a daily for both Miss Bruce and mum and was a huge part of my growing up. She loved to tell local stories and one was her days of delivering the post on foot to the whole of Tunley, Waterlane and Oakridge, during the war years. Quite a remarkable woman!

Our dog walks in the 1960's took us into most houses in Tunley at one time or another. Most of the properties were of a simple 'two up and two down' size, many of which were derelict. I remember loving to climb along the old rafters in what then existed of Tunley Cottage, and pretending to drive on the old red tractor that had been conveniently left for us to play on in the garden! This was one of many old tractors that were delightfully scattered about the area, including a blue one in the gardens at Trillis where the derelict house was also fun to climb before Mick Beard got his hands on it. Old Phyllis Finch from Kings Farm was a local stalwart. Her family have been around Tunley for a very long time and have even lived at Hillhouse Farm at the end of the 19th century. Kings Farm is now owned by Phyllis's niece, Diane Barnett, who is the fourth generation of her family to live there. Amongst other interesting stories she has to tell, she told me a bomb was dropped on her garden pond (narrowly missing the house) during the war which changed the course of the stream that runs beside her house.

One of the lovely things about Hillhouse Farm is that it remains unspoilt. Whilst properties around us have been enlarged and modernised, ours is still the old traditional Cotswold stone farm with its small fields, surrounded by hedgerows and stone walls. We have been greatly aided in this by our dear friend Lionel Robbins who has loyally come and helped both me and my mother keep it in shape for several decades. Our walls would not be so beautifully restored without him. The old farm house retains its larder, old wash room, game house and many other old features including a very fine unique staircase. (I believe there is only one other staircase like it in the country - somewhere in Waterlane.)

How I came to be so lucky as to be able to inherit the farm on my mother's death is a story in itself. Some pieces of universally gifted financial magic intervened and suddenly I found to my extreme joy that I would be able to live here until I die if I wish. This luck caused me to open the old farm house for others to share and enjoy during the summer months, in order that they may too partake of the magic and enjoy the tranquillity, peace and beauty to the full. Many thousands of people from all over the world have found their way here over the years. I hope I have many more happy years here in this beautiful part of the Cotswolds gifting to others as I have been gifted.

DISTRICT NEWS

I have been District Councillor for Bisley, Eastcombe and Oakridge since last May, and I do my best to represent all residents of the Ward. I am on two Stroud District Council committees: Environment (responsible for waste and recycling, environmental health, canals, and carbon management, among other things) and Development Control (i.e. planning). I'm on a 'Task and Finish' group of the Environment Committee, working with parish councils around the district to help create and improve cycling and walking routes.

I am also on the Parish Council, and I hope serving on both councils enables me to better represent local interests at the district level. My priorities include helping the area and its residents respond to the challenges of climate change; protecting our beautiful environment and aiding nature recovery; supporting the more vulnerable and those in need; making our roads safer for all; and supporting local businesses. I will work with my council colleagues to help alleviate the energy and cost of living crises for local people, to the extent we can.

I lived in New York for many years, where I worked as a teacher, including teaching chess in primary schools and English to immigrants. I and my wife Leigh have lived in Bisley for five years, but we have known the area well since my parents came to live here 30 years ago. As we all try to recover from the effects of the Pandemic, here are 5 important points about your local Citizens Advice:

- We are a local Charity, totally independent of government, providing free confidential impartial advice to everyone in Stroud District areas, including Dursley, Stonehouse, Nailsworth, Wotton-Under-Edge and Berkeley. The same service is available to everyone in Cotswold District, including Cirencester, Tetbury and Moreton-in-Marsh. The delivery of our Service relies on the dedication of our fully trained volunteers supported by a small team of paid staff. We have been providing a Service in Stroud since 1958, when we were known as the CAB.
- Your local Citizens Advice office continued to operate a limited service during the Pandemic with volunteer members of staff working from home. Now that restrictions are being eased, we are working very hard to manage face to face interviews again, which are vital to many people. We are also making every effort to reopen our outreach and community hub services.
- Our main areas of enquiry at this time are: Employment, Energy issues, Welfare Benefits and Debt issues. Since December 2021 we have given information and support to 705 members of our local community. We are extremely grateful for our core funding from The District, Town and Parish Councils, but we still need to raise an additional £25,000 every year to maintain the Service.
- Citizens Advice in Stroud has a very active PR and Fundraising Committee who continue to organise fundraising events to help finance such essentials as training and improved technology, as well as improved premises. We are extremely grateful for all donations, especially from our donors who provide us with annual standing orders, one off donations and legacies. This source of funding is vital to the continuation of our Service.


