The hall is now fully open but the NHS QR poster for track and trace is still in place, and it is recommended that hall hirers keep a list of those attending events. We are providing hand sanitizers and disinfectant cleaning material.

COMMUNITY RESTART PROGRAMME

The Village Hall Trust has received significant financial support from the government during the pandemic. To help the local community recover from this difficult period and encourage hall use, hirers will be able to gain free hall usage for a period of six months from September 2021 to February 2022. This will result in some of the grants received by the hall being shared with the community.

How to Book Free Hall Use The hall may be booked for hire free of charge up to the value of £50 per month from September 1, 2021. Any usage over this value will be charged at normal rates.

NATURE NOTES FROM WATERLANE



I was watching a magpie one day marvelling at how it was dancing between the legs of a moving horse. It is an opportunistic bird, and in this case was looking for any insects and grain disturbed by the hooves of the horse. It was also perching on the backs of the horses to relieve

relieve them of any insects they may be carrying; this seemed an amicable arrangement for them both. They make very good parents, both feeding their young. There was a charming scene in my flower bed one morning where a very patient mother was trying to groom the ruffled feathers of her youngster while it was having fun tossing rose petals in the air.

Their presence is often first revealed by their call, a hoarse laughing chatter. It has bold iridescent black and white plumage with a long wedge shaped tail in flight. The hoarding instinct common to all crows is highly developed in magpies, they are liable to hide not only surplus food but also any colourful or shiny object which takes their fancy.

They very often rob other bird nests, including partridge and pheasant, of eggs and young and this is what upset gamekeepers in the past and caused them to be persecuted. It has long been regarded as a bird of bad omen. The most familiar superstition about sighting the handsome black and white bird is expressed in the adage 'one for sorrow, two for joy'. To protect themselves against the sorrow which the sight of a single magpie might bring, people used to cross themselves or raise their hats to the bird.

It is she who is responsible for the colour schemes and placing or removing of the plants throughout the garden. She told me it was her dream job that she was given three years ago. There were so many beautiful parts to remember, the White Garden, the charming Knot Garden, the Topiary Walk, but for me the star of the whole place was the huge herbaceous border in rich reds, browns, oranges and yellows, with everything from roses to red hot pokers, to a banana tree surrounded with early dahlias. We ended the day with a very welcome tea and scones in the cool of the barn.

IN MEMORIAM

PAT CARRICK

Patricia Joan Carrick 'Pat', passed away on 13th June with her family by her side. She was an important member of the village community for many years, and a number of tributes follow below in her memory.

Pat, who lived at Hillview, Waterlane, died recently after a long illness. She will be remembered by many for her great interest in the local community and the welfare of its inhabitants. She was for many years on the Stroud District Council, representing Bisley, where she was involved in several initiatives including the promotion the Warmth and Wellbeing programme. She also served on the Bisley parish council where, for some years, she held the position of chair. Pat started the Oakridge Lunch Club and the Oakridge History Group following the publication of *Oakridge, A History* which she co-authored. Another of her interests was the Oakridge Village Hall, and many of the improvements which we take for granted today can be traced back to her involvement in the Oakridge Village Hall Trust. Together with her husband Gordon, she enjoyed the life and history of this rural community. *John Loosley*

Pat was always active in our Community. She started with What's On. She was a Parish Councilor for many years and a Ward Chairman. She was also a District Councillor for four years and together with a colleague introduced a scheme called "Warm and Well" which was for loft insulation for the over 70's. On her own initiative she decided something needed to be done about the condition of the village hall, as the previous committee did nothing to improve it and would not apply for grants even at the Millennium. She appointed herself as chairman, formed a committee and under her guidance a grant was obtained from Stroud District Council for a central heating system replacing the high level heaters which were ineffective resulting in the installation of a boiler and several radiators being installed. At around the same time by a stroke of luck after the cancellation of an order for £4,000 of plaster board insulation, the late Richard Bryant offered it to the village hall committee which they very gladly accepted, it was enough to cover the walls. Further grant funded improvements followed including the suspended ceiling.

The next step was to improve the very old kitchen and a grant was successfully applied for from Gloucestershire Rural Community Council on condition of the formation of a Lunch Club which she did and is very popular. *Gill Davis*

My memories of her centre round her boundless enthusiasm for everything to do with local people and local history. Collaboration over writing the History Book was an exercise in trying to contain the amount of information Pat collected in the space available - she could never believe that any bit of reminiscence was not worth trying to squeeze in somewhere! *Kay Rhodes*

I miss you Pat, with your lovely smile which could light up the room, and your loyal friendship. We shared many happy times together with your dear daughter Sue, with Sheila, and Margaret at family parties. The fun in the early days of the village pantomime, rehearsals often a source of helpless laughter at missed cues and forgotten lines! Such happy memories, another dear friend Daisy once said "memories are the only thing we have left that those ***** up in Parliament haven't taxed yet!"

Thank you Pat, for being part of my Happy Memories. Rest in Peace dear friend.



Spotlight on Margaret Heath





started to talk to Margaret, she had nothing interesting to course was far from the truth. born in Cinderford (where her Bridge pub and grandfather Heywood) and later moved to then Lincoln, Nottingham and Moors before settling in the 1978, having homes in France Lane and now Oakridge

Her late husband Malcolm, was a first-class English professional cricketer playing for Hampshire until his retirement in 1962. After this, the family moved to Lincoln when Malcolm started working in quality control for Guinness. Further job moves took them to Nottingham in 1964 and near Scarborough in 1965.

At the time when Malcolm was playing cricket professionally, wives were sometimes allowed to accompany their husbands but could only use the Ladies' Pavilion and children were only allowed at the edges of the ground. However, Margaret was responsible for laundering Malcolm's cricket whites! Cricketers were often away for up to a week at a time so Margaret was kept busy bringing up their children Richard, born in 1962 and Julia born in 1966. When they moved here, the children were aged 12 and 16 and at first Richard missed the sea-fishing in Yorkshire. They soon settled in though with Richard attending Thomas Keble School and Julia the Deer Park 6th Form. They have both settled locally.

Malcolm later played for Gloucester Gypsies and also Lord Vesty's team when Margaret was able to accompany him to lunches at the Bishop of Gloucester's house.

Margaret's childhood claim to fame is that she was related to the playwright Dennis Potter and was in the same class as him in her primary school in the Forest of Dean. Dennis was part of the gang of children who all played together, so she spent a lot of time with him.

In her early days, Margaret trained as a ballerina and was invited for interview in London at the age of 13 where she could have carried on her training but she didn't want to leave home.

Margaret attended the School of Art in Southampton and she still counts craft, embroidery and water-colour painting amongst her hobbies. She brought

along some lovely watercolours of flowers as well as examples of her intricate beadwork. She belongs to Broadwell Beadwork Club near Stowthe-Wold. She also brought me a beautifully made tussie mussie. These 'talking' bouquets of flowers and herbs are meant to be a celebration of craft, folklore and the language and meaning of flowers.

Until the children arrived, Margaret worked in the dispensary of a pharmacy and met some colourful people in this job. In particular, she remembers a larger than life Egyptian who lived in a lovely home apparently for by the large amount of dollars earned from the sailors on the cruise

for services rendered! She used to ask Margaret to go to her house to perm her hair (remember the Toni home perms?) for which she was very well paid. Margaret later enjoyed working at Hunt and Winterbotham at Lodgemore Mill where she dealt with the sale of high quality cloth to the public.

For about 20 years she volunteered with Meals on Wheels, collecting the meals, delivering and driving to homes over a wide area covering Oakridge, Chalford and Frampton Mansell.

Friends she has met along the way include Ann Fry, Gill and John Young, Mary Fern, Jenny Black, Pat Carrick, Judy Mackie, Janet Gaskell and Maureen Dewhurst.

DISTRICT NEWS

Telecommunications Mast: EE's proposal to erect a telecommunications mast in Far Oakridge now seems to have been withdrawn, possibly thanks to strong local activism. It is understood they are now looking at a site on the other side of the valley, between Sapperton and Frampton Mansell, where it will be less visible in the woodland.

Illegal Waste Storage and Burning: SDC successfully prosecuted a Bisley landowner for illegal storage and burning of waste, at a site near the Green Shop. Wilfred Hunt admitted four offences and was fined £3426.85 by Cheltenham Magistrates on June 30th.

Tree Preservation Order: A TPO on five trees at St Marys, Eastcombe, opposite Thomas Keble School, was confirmed by the Development Control Committee, over the objection of the landowner. A number of trees on the site had already been felled, to the dismay of local residents. The Parish Council asked for the TPO to protect the remaining mature pines, beeches and a sycamore. The vote of the Committee was unanimous. I was pleased to be one of these votes. **Please contact me if you have suggestions for trees you think should be protected by TPOs.**

Ebley Mill Council Offices: SDC is still asking residents to make appointments to visit the council offices, though I understand visitors without appointments are being helped. Staff and Council Members are still wearing masks when moving around the offices, and desks and council chamber seats are still distanced. To contact the council on any matter call 01453 766 321 (or outside office hours for emergencies 01453 222104).

Business Grants: £500,000 remaining in the business funding pot was distributed to businesses by the end of June deadline. This means SDC is eligible for an extra £1m to distribute to businesses. Neighbourhood wardens did a good job helping to get businesses to apply before the deadline. SDC has also distributed £3.6 m via the flexible Additional Restrictions Grant.

Local Walking and Cycling Infrastruture Plan (LCWIP): The County Council is developing 'LCWIP's for areas of the County including Stroud, and gave a presentation on this to the Environment Committee in June. These plans will be the basis for applying for funding for such projects as new cycling routes. Please contact me if you would be interested in being part of a local network to help develop the cycling parts of this plan to reach areas such as ours.

Parliamentary Constituency Boundary Change: This is not really a District Council matter - it will not involve any change to the District or to Parishes - but as you may know, the Boundary Commission for England is proposing changes to the constituency boundaries which would remove Bisley, Eastcombe and Oakridge from Stroud constituency and make this area part of a new Cotswold constituency. My view is that we should remain in Stroud. The historical, geographical and cultural connections of this area to Stroud are strong - indeed, Stroud was once part of Bisley Parish! The consultation period is until August 2nd. Anyone can comment at https://www.bcereviews.org.uk/. Electric Vehicle Charging Points: Gloucestershire County Council is funding a network of electric vehicle charging points, and there is a possibility of bidding to get one (or more) in this area. COUNTY COUNCIL NEWS

It has been a busy month for county Councillors as we return to holding meetings in a socially distanced council chamber although Full council which can also be viewed on- line continue to be held in the large tennis centre in Gloucester.

Council Funding additional Wellbeing for School Staff

The county council is giving all schools, academies, MAT's and independents in the county, free access to specialist support to look after their staff wellbeing over the next twelve months. We recognise what a challenging time this is for schools and for all staff across each school community, who have continued to support the county's children throughout an unprecedented, ever-changing and demanding period. With effect from 1 May 2021 and for the coming year, all staff in schools across Gloucestershire will be able to access support from a 24-hour Employee Assistance Programme (EAP) provided by Health Assured, one of the UK's leading providers of Employee Assistance. Working with the county council since 2016, their counselling service is the only one accredited by the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy.

Cabinet doubles holiday hunger fund to more than £2.7m

At its meeting on Wednesday 23 June, the county council's Cabinet approved a £2.7m fund to support vulnerable children during the school summer holidays. The cabinet agreed to allocate £1.39m of funding from the Department for Education to deliver the Holiday Activities and Food

programme (HAF) which will be available throughout Gloucestershire during August and at Christmas.

Efficient and greener scheme for food waste

A new food waste contractor will help to continue the county's efforts to tackle climate change and save money.

A report going to Gloucestershire County Council's cabinet next Wednesday (21 July) recommends that Ubico is awarded a contract to take Gloucestershire's food waste to a recycling plant in Bishops Cleeve. All six district councils in the county provide a weekly kerbside food waste collection service for their residents and it is the county council's job to recycle this food waste. In 2020/21, the service collected and treated a total of 24,400 tonnes of food waste, which generates clean, green and eco-friendly energy to power homes. The fertiliser it produces also helps farmers grow bigger and healthier crops. Currently four of the districts have their food waste taken to the plant by different providers, but under new streamlined plans it would be collected by just one company. The proposed contract with Ubico, worth £1.6 million, would start in October 2021 and last for eight years offering a potential 20 per cent saving to the taxpayer.

Recycling Metal Really Matters

In a countywide social media campaign, residents are being encouraged to recycle their metal packaging to make every can count. Metal can be recycled endlessly so the county and all six district councils have teamed up with MetalMatters to highlight the benefits of recycling our metal packaging to inspire everyone to get involved and do their bit. With more than 12 billion items of aluminium packaging alone sold every year in the UK, householders are being encouraged to recycle their cans, foil, empty aerosols, trays, tubes and metal screw tops. Every district in the county provides a frequent and convenient door-to-door recycling service so it's never been easier to recycle our metal packaging; and once recycled, it takes around 60 days for a drinks can to return to the supermarket shelf.

Regular rapid testing remains vital to slowing the spread of COVID-19 Around 1 in 3 people who have COVID-19 have no symptoms at all. Rapid tests help to detect the virus in people who might not know they have it, so that they can self- isolate quickly to prevent passing Covid on to their family, friends and work colleagues.

Since the Government first announced that rapid testing was available to everyone in England, the way you can get your free test kit in the county has changed to make it even easier to access.

Here is how you can get yours:

- **Pharmacy Collect.** There are more than 100 pharmacies county-wide that have rapid testing kits in-store for people to collect and use at home
- **On-site pharmacy testing.** Some local pharmacies have come on board to offer on-site testing for people who haven't yet used a rapid flow test, or residents who would like some support and guidance to take the test. For a full list of which pharmacies you can collect your kit from or where you can get support to take your test on-site visit: NHS Site Finder Map.

• **Community Collect.** You can pick up your rapid test kit from Hempsted Meadows, Cheltenham, High Street Car Park and Stratford Park Leisure Centre testing centres. Collection is available Monday-Sunday at Gloucester and Cheltenham between 2.30 pm to 8pm and Monday-Sunday between 1.30pm and 7pm in Stroud. You can check online if the location is open or busy before you go
