

NATURE NOTES FROM WATERLANE



I have had some resident pheasants in my garden over winter and early spring, and it gave me a fascinating insight into their habits and social life. The adult male pheasant has a red face and glossy green head with a long pointed tail, the female is smaller and is well camouflaged with mottled buff to blackish plumage. They are usually seen on the ground during the day roaming the woodland edge and agricultural land but prefer to roost at night in the trees.

The pheasant's natural home is in Asia, from the Caucasus eastwards to China. They were introduced here in the early middle ages and by the 16th century they were common. Late in the following century birds from China were introduced and these were distinguished by the white neck -rings on the male.

I scattered some bird seed on the ground for them when food was scarce and I was rewarded with a happy mewling noise in return while they were pecking at the seed. The other noise I got was a loud crow by the male when disturbed, especially in the early hours of the morning. Mating starts early in the year with the male following several females around the fields. He banks his wing to show his interest and is persistent in his pursuit, copulation seemed to take place when the female was ready and not before.

I had two male pheasants having a confrontation on the lawn one morning, they were facing each other, crouching very low, bobbing and weaving like a couple of professional boxers. Occasionally they would rise up to try and get an advantage, they have spurs on the backs of their legs with which they hack at each other using vicious downward blows. This went on for some time before a female stepped in to stop the quarrel. It didn't stop the males they just went around the corner of the cottage and carried on their fighting.

TELECOMS MAST IN FAR OAKRIDGE

No, this hasn't gone away! EE are continuing to search for a site for their Telecoms Mast to supply the Government with ESN (Emergency Services Network) on a short section of road from Tunley to the Daneway Inn. So a mast will be going up somewhere.

THEY ARE STILL CONSIDERING FAR OAKRIDGE AS A LOCATION – if you want to be kept in touch with developments please let us have your email address (send to Tony.Martin@Bisley-with-Lypiatt.gov.uk)

They are looking at another location in the woods along the lane between Sapperton and Frampton Mansell (not in our Parish), but we do not know where they are with any planning application. We are liaising with Sapperton PC to try to keep in touch.

BACKGROUND - EE submitted a pre-application planning notice for the erection of a 20m telecoms mast on the edge of Far Oakridge (on the way towards Tunley) to SDC planning in August 2020. Their pretext was that they have a contract with the UK government to provide full Emergency Services Network (ESN) across the whole area. This was withdrawn in September 2020 after coordinated opposition by a number of local residents who had formed an informal opposition group believing that the proposal from EE not only provided the ESN but was also a commercial telecoms mast.

Since then, EE have continued with background operations to increase their likelihood of achieving success with their preferred site. A small opposition group of local residents has continued a low-level fight against the manoeuvrings of EE and are now looking to gather wider support of the local community to help oppose the Mast being located in or around Far Oakridge.

THE FUTURE - Whilst EE continue to pursue the mast location on the edge of Far Oakridge, we are aware they are looking at a number of alternative locations within the area, but we do not know the exact locations. However, they have recently unveiled an additional new location situated on the lane between Sapperton and Frampton Mansell and within the woodland area (we believe this to be on the Bathurst Estate). This proposed additional location is situated outside our Parish (and indeed outside SDC area – in Cotswold District Council area). We have yet to fully evaluate this new site but it would initially seem that it is not near any housing and would seem to have a lower overall impact.

When we have any contact from EE or they submit a pre-planning application, we are planning to set up a meeting to which the whole community would be invited in order to update everyone and discuss the way forward – especially in the light of the new proposal from EE. We will be seeking engagement with EE to gather a greater understanding of their plans and to hopefully be able to encourage and support a solution which is acceptable to the whole community.

NAILS DELIBERATELY DEPOSITED ON LOCAL FOOTPATHS AND BRIDLEPATHS

We have had worrying reports that someone has deposited nails on paths and bridleways around our Parish, presumably to deter off-road motorbikes and 4x4 cars from using them. This can not only puncture the tyres of off-road cars and motorbikes, but could seriously injure people (they could easily go through wellington boots), horses and dogs – and possibly any other wildlife using the paths eg deer, badgers, foxes etc

The Police and GCC Highways have been informed and will be taking action against both the illegal nail depositors AND the illegal off road motor vehicles.

If you find any nails deposited could you please report it to GCC Highways Harriett.Osburn@gloucestershire.gov.uk preferably using WHAT 3 WORDS APP <https://what3words.com/how-to-use-the-what3words-app/> which you can download onto your mobile (this app can give a locational position within a 3m box so GCC would be able to send a crew to the exact location pick up the nails).

COUNTY COUNCIL NEWS

Dear Residents,

I am writing to introduce myself as the newly elected County Councillor for the Bisley with Lypiatt and Painswick Division. I consider it to be a huge honour and privilege to serve the community for the next four years and will be working hard on your behalf. I would, of course, like to thank all who voted for me and have given me this opportunity to serve as a Councillor.

I would also like to congratulate Martin Brown for being elected as our District Councillor. Martin and I will be working closely together and in fact have already met with our Local Highways Manager to discuss concerns. Your needs as a community will be individually focused, but each ward level priorities are to forge a transparent line of communication between yourselves and Shire Hall.

I have started my induction training sessions at the County Council and our first full council was on Wednesday 19th May. I have been nominated to serve on the additional following committees:

- Environmental Scrutiny
- Audit and Governance
- Commons rights of way
- Planning Traffic regulation order

I will keep you updated on County issues which affect us although aware that this is bi-monthly publication so would advise residents to contact me directly if they wish to discuss a particular area of concern.

Highways

Once again, there has been an increased spend on Highways. In addition to this each County Councillor has a local highways "pot" of £30,000 this year to spend on local priorities and small minor works. I will be asking the Parish councillors to forward a schedule of Highways and Minor Works "wish list" so that I can cross-reference this with GCC Highways and lobby on your behalf for schemes to be programmed in.

School Vouchers

I can report that this school half term at the end of May, Gloucestershire County Council is again providing vouchers to parents who have signed up to our holiday Free School Meals scheme. These vouchers are provided by

Gloucestershire County Council as part of our commitment that 'no child goes hungry'.

Any parents who have previously signed up to the scheme and have received vouchers before will not need to reapply - they will automatically receive the vouchers. There is also a link to sign-up on the GCC website.

Pharmacies to take lead on community rapid COVID-19 testing

Further pharmacies are joining the list of those offering COVID testing to make it even easier for people without symptoms to get their free twice-weekly test. As well as pharmacies offering rapid testing, people can still collect tests from PCR testing centres in Gloucester, Cheltenham and Stroud or order kits online for home delivery.

The NHS Site Finder map <https://maps.test-and-trace.nhs.uk/> includes the locations of all participating pharmacies, our four community testing sites and Community Collect points across the county.

COURGETTE LEMON DRIZZLE CAKE

For all the bakers in the community, a transformation of the humble lemon drizzle cake, one of the nation's favourite bakes, into a gorgeous courgette-filled cake. Yep, courgette gives a bake lovely moisture - and you're sure to love this.

Perfect for using up a glut of courgettes during the summer season.

Prep: 15 mins

Cooking time: 1 hour

10 servings

Easy

Ingredients:

150 ml vegetable oil

200 g caster sugar

3 medium eggs

3 Finely grated zest of 2 lemons and juice of 1 lemon

1 large courgette, around 200g, coarsely grated

250 g self-raising flour

1/2 tsp. bicarbonate of soda

FOR THE DRIZZLE

Finely grated zest and juice of 1 lemon

75 g granulated sugar

Method:

1. Preheat oven to 180°C (160°C fan) mark 4. Grease and line a 900g loaf tin. In a large bowl, beat together the oil, caster sugar, and eggs with a wooden spoon until smooth.
2. Stir in the lemon zest and juice and the grated courgette. Sift in the flour and bicarbonate of soda and fold in gently until no floury patches remain. Tip into the prepared tin and bake for 55min-1hr until risen, golden and a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean
3. Remove from the oven and gently pierce all over with a toothpick or skewer.
4. Make the drizzle by stirring half the lemon zest with the remaining drizzle ingredients together in a small bowl. Spoon this over the top of the hot cake and allow to cool completely in the tin.
5. Sprinkle over the remaining zest. Remove cake from tin and serve in slices.
