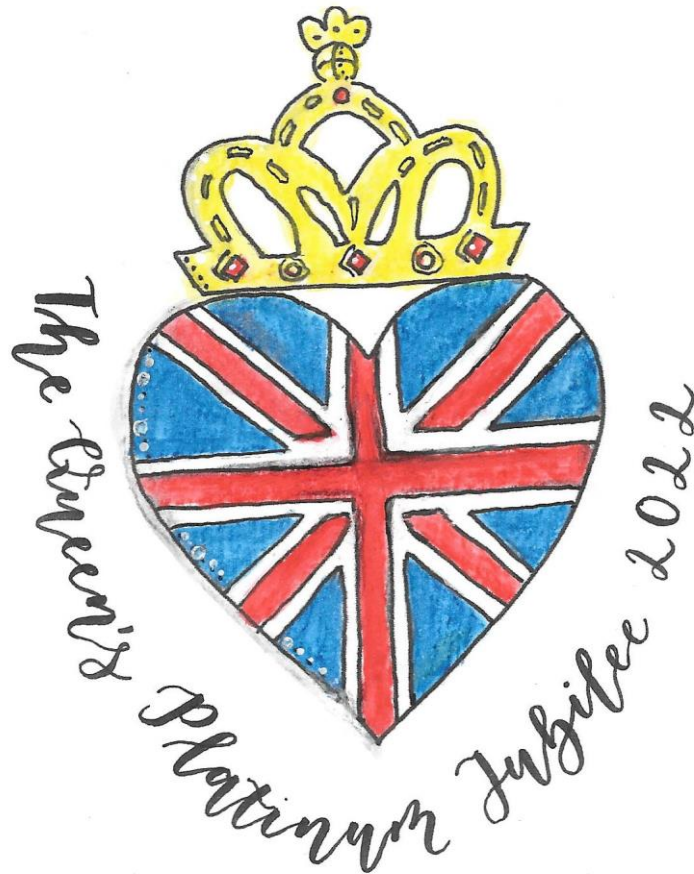

OAKRIDGE HISTORY GROUP



A visit to the archives at Gloucestershire Hub and Family History Centre was a great success. For some it was the first time they had seen the extent of the materials available to view and for others a chance to see more details than they had before. Kate Maisey had got out a number of documents requested specific to Oakridge, and we were able to see the original church burial register, school logbooks, WW2 map of the area showing where bombs were dropped, sale particulars of some houses and farms and many photographs taken by Stanley Gardiner.

The May meeting was a chance to browse a collection of documents, photos, scrapbooks and stitched and sewn pieces held in the History Group collection (ex Oakridge Museum) which have not been on view for years. Letters, cuttings books, banners from the Wesleyan Chapel school, account books, catalogues, photos, and children's samplers were on display. The mixture was wide-ranging - there were glimpses of people, artefacts, institutions, and the surrounding natural environment.

Records are in various forms and range from a fabric hanging in memory of the death of a school pupil, to a photographic 'snapshot' of the millennium, from a catalogue of the fabulous animal carvings by William Simmonds, to records of wild flower distribution and plans for wild flower preservation at the Pleasure Ground. With another Jubilee celebration imminent, we viewed the records of some previous events and festivities.

At our 22nd June meeting we will be holding a brief AGM followed by Carol Maxwell who will talk about the rich history of Painswick and its mills and then on August 10th (not July 27th as originally planned) she will lead a walk round Painswick looking at the buildings themselves.

NATURE NOTES FROM WATERLANE



This time of the year what could be more magical than walking through our woodland and coming across a carpet of our native bluebells. They are common in most parts of Britain, blooming in woods, hedges and scrubland, on sea cliffs and mountains. They are found in the Atlantic areas

from north-western Spain to the British Isles and are a symbol of humility, constancy and gratitude. It is early flowering allowing it to make the most of the sunlight that is still able to make it to the forest floor before the canopy becomes too thick,

A common folk name for bluebells was 'crowtoes' and their small white bulbs

were used to make glue. The bulbs also contain starch which was used to stiffen the elaborate ruffs worn by the gentlefolk in Elizabethan times. Other names for the bluebell are wild hyacinth, woodbell, bell bottle, cuckoo's boots, Ladies Nightcap and witches thimbles.

Nowadays digging up bluebell bulbs for any purpose is illegal, but recent scientific research has shown that it is the trampling-down of the leaves by heavy-footed sightseers that most threatens the survival of the bluebell. The plant can survive without the flowers, but if the leaves are crushed, it dies for the lack of food.

The other bluebell commonly found is the Spanish bluebell which was introduced by the Victorians as a garden plant but escaped into the wild. I find the best way to differentiate the two is our native bluebell has deep violet-blue, narrow, tubular-bell flowers with tips that curl back and the flowers are on one side of drooping stems.

Another threat to the native bluebell is the competition from the wild garlic plant, which is clearly seen below us in the woods at Water Lane where the wild garlic has over-run the bluebells. The best place to see our native bluebell locally is in the woods at Tunley.

GWT CREATES GOLDEN VALLEY 'SUPER RESERVE'

Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust has recently purchased two new nature reserves which will link with other wild spaces in Stroud's Golden Valley to form an eco highway for wildlife. Creating bigger, better and more connected areas for wildlife is part of GWT's strategy for the next eight years, and was an important factor in the recent purchase of Trillis Banks and Blackness Banks in Stroud's Golden Valley.

Trillis Banks

A hidden gem of the Golden Valley Nature Recovery Zone (NRZ), Trillis is situated next door to Siccaridge Wood nature reserve, linking with Daneway Banks and Sapperton Valley reserves to form a 'super reserve' for wildlife.

With a south-east facing bank of species-rich grassland, Trillis has a slightly different aspect to the other grassland reserves with increased habitat niches that allow species to adapt to climate change. Southern-facing grasslands, traditionally the most species-rich in the cool British climate, may suffer in the future with increasingly drought-like summers. Having an increase in aspects and slope will allow wildlife to adapt to seasonal fluctuations.

"We have been working with the previous owner for a couple of years, providing advice on conservation grazing and securing funding to install infrastructure to allow this to happen," said Alan Sumnall, GWT's Lead Land Manager East. "When the opportunity arose to purchase this magnificent site, we were supported by a very generous private donation to make it happen".

The reserve also has areas of ancient woodland, scrub, and part of the disused canal adjacent to Sapperton Valley – this adds to the mosaic of habitats protected and will support an increased number of species as GWT begins work

on connecting habitat by creating soft edges between grassland and woodland boundaries.

This further complements GWT's connectivity work in the Golden Valley NRZ and builds on the momentum with current funded projects, working with landowners to connect Daneway Banks to Dimmels Dale nature reserve further along the valley.

Blackness Banks

Further along the valley, this nature reserve adds to the Golden Valley NRZ which links GWT's working area to the adjacent Stroud Commons, managed by the National Trust. The purchase of Blackness Banks was possible thanks to a legacy donation, a great example of where money left in a will can go towards protecting our country's wildlife for future generations to enjoy.

"This is a game changer as we are making real steps in meeting our aspirations to create thriving habitats for insects in our NRZ," said Alan. "It is also the first where we can showcase what we can do working with private landowners and project partners such as the Royal Entomological Society, with whom we co-own Daneway Banks."

With the purchase of these two wild spaces, GWT has increased the amount of species-rich grassland it manages in the Golden Valley by 75%. Active management of land in between all the green spaces in the Golden Valley NRZ will benefit a number of species, such as adder, Roman snail and the small blue butterfly, allowing them an opportunity to disperse and build larger populations more resilient to future challenges.

Our speaker for 14th April about the work of Sue Ryder will now be with us in October. Best laid plans and all that! However, at short notice we were delighted to welcome Chris Evans, with a fascinating talk about the Butterfly Garden charity, and what a wonderful and lovely informal evening it was.

Chris told us of his family history at Dundry Nursery, and how his love of horticulture from an early age progressed to helping autistic spectrum and challenged children, initially for ONE afternoon a week through a school connection. Expansion of the site over 20 years provides, along with planting and growing, several 'sheds', craftwork shops, a kitchen and now helps 283 students of all ages. Help is also offered to immigrants in order for them to

overcome their mental health issues. The site is open to visitors, an option we hope to undertake in the near future.

12th May "The History of Recorded Sound" with Patrick Furley. Well! What a performance! A huge display was presented of recording and playing machines. His talk began with the playing of a record 'Memories', followed by 'In the Mood'. Were we in the mood? YES! Little did we know what an amusing and entertaining evening we were in for. A short history about Edison and his inventions intended for use as dictation machines from 1840 onwards, which he eventually dropped for his interest in electricity.

Wax discs were, of course, the original form of recording, and Celia recorded a message on a wax cylinder which was played back to us later. Amazing. 1920's evening entertainment on record a musical Quiz. 1912 a record from the singers on the Titanic. A vast subject covering all emotions, the outstanding one being laughter.

4th June WI hope to see the whole village turn out to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee

Spotlight on

Maurice and Anne Brain



Maurice was born in Drybrook, in the Forest of Dean and Anne was born in Bristol. Maurice was not particularly enamoured of secondary school (then Abenhall School in Mitcheldean) but loved playing cricket. He eventually went on to become a qualified civil engineer. They met when the first Severn Bridge was opened and Maurice used to go into Bristol on nights out. After they got married, they first lived in Gloucester and then in Hempsted but weren't particularly happy with either place.

In 1973 Maurice and Anne were lucky enough to buy a piece of land in Oakridge after the original buyer from Birmingham was banned from driving and consequently backed out of the purchase. The land had been used for pigs and had a small derelict building on site; Anne and Maurice lived in a caravan on the site for for 10 months while the house was built. Being a civil engineer, Maurice was able to design the property and did a lot of the building work himself in his spare time. They initially had trouble getting the design through as planning wanted mullion windows, but planning was eventually granted. Maurice had help from his friend Frank Finch, a real local character and a kind man, who used his equipment to dig out the foundations for the house which

they appropriately named 'The Venture'. They were fortunate also to have local experts (Trevor Fern's father for roofing and plastering and Barry Hunt for woodwork).

Maurice started his civil engineering career with a private company, then Gloucester Rural District Council before moving in 1974 to Cotswold D.C., with a later brief spell on the motorways with Gloucester C.C. before becoming Works Manager in Stroud District Council where Anne also worked in administration for 17 years, with some of their years coinciding.

In 1977 Maurice took a job on an irrigation scheme in the desert in Saudi Arabia, with Anne joining him later. Although initially he found the move difficult, they both ended up loving it. Anne worked in admin for both the consultant and the contractors. As a woman, she wasn't strictly allowed to work and, on one occasion, climbed out of the office window to avoid a visit from the local police (who usually announced their intended visit!)

On returning to the UK in 1980, Maurice's next job was working on the Orwell Bridge in Suffolk - a big change in temperatures after living in Saudi. Seeking more adventure, they moved in 1981 to a sugar plantation in Nigeria with a Commonwealth organisation but life proved difficult and they returned home in 1982.

BISLEY COMMUNITY COMPOSTING SCHEME

Many Oakridge members – and residents who aren't members - of the Bisley Community Composting scheme may not be aware of the wider educational work that BCCS undertakes. Since 2014 we have campaigned against the use of peat in gardening and now are working closely with Bisley Climate Action Group to take that message further.

We have always worked with schools and other voluntary groups raising the profile of composting. In International Composting Awareness week and with support from Stroud District Council's Community Officers and the County Council's Master Composting Scheme, we worked with three marvellous groups at Nailsworth Scouts Groups. We made compost bins, explored biodiversity in the soil, and how a live soil is essential for our health and helps keep carbon in the ground and so helps prevent climate change. Biodiversity is also a key theme for allotment holders and gardeners. The Parish Council has banned the use of pesticides on its own and managed land, thus supporting nature recovery community actions. This year the National Allotment Society's campaigning theme of "Bugs, Bees and Broccoli" is supported by the Parish Council and we ask all allotment tenants and gardeners to protect those wonderful bugs and record them for our survey.

- **Thomas Keble School Rebuilding:** An application has been submitted to SDC for this project. It can be seen, and comments submitted, on the council website: <https://www.stroud.gov.uk/planning>. I have requested

a 'call-in' to the Development Control Committee for this to be considered by councillors – rather than just officers under delegated powers.

- **Motion – 20's Plenty:** I proposed a motion at the last full council meeting calling for Gloucestershire County Council to make 20mph the default speed limit for residential areas throughout Gloucestershire. The motion was passed by a majority. The council joins many parish and town councils (including Bisley) and other district councils throughout the county in this campaign.
- **Council Tax Energy Rebate:** The council is issuing the £150 rebates to residents in Council Tax Bands D and below, and others who qualify. If you pay by direct debit, you should have received your rebate by May 26th. Others will be contacted by letter or e-mail and told how to apply.
- **A Thread of Light:** Exhibition of glass art by internationally known artists, including five who live and work in Stroud, at the Museum in the Park, until June 12th. It's free, and the museum in Stratford Park (and the park!) is always worth a visit.

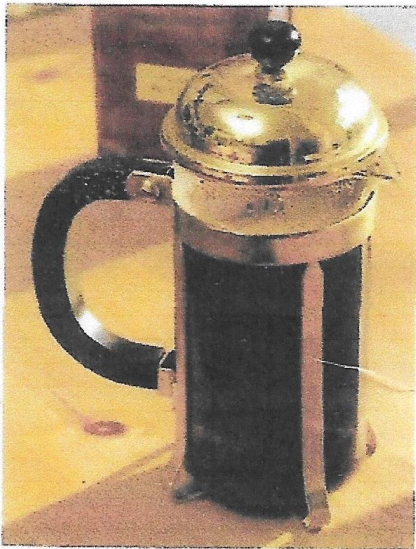
